
Core values of research in TSPJ

- collaborative research
- politically engaged approaches
- commitment to fostering a world that is just and sustainable

Takes into account

- environmental values and ethics
- power dynamics and competition
- well-being and justice


Transformative Society, Politics, and Justice (TSPJ)

Ecological Economics (ECEC)

- Ecological economics: the socio-economic system is embedded in the environmental system = economics with planetary and social boundaries
- Conducting ecological economics research
- Apply EE concepts and insights to key social/political issue, including issues related to North-South
- Apply EE concepts to key policy issues such as circular economy and energy transition
- Current status: will run (19 students)

Agroecology & Organic Gardening Systems (AOGS)

- Theoretical and practical introduction to agroecology and organic farming
- Practical soil management, crop rotation, companion planting, weed and insect management, and urban composting techniques
- Work on personal (permaculture) garden design project
- Current status: will run (13 students)


Winter term

Emotions in the Environmental Sciences (EES)

- For anyone who has experienced ecoanxiety or –grief or solastalgia or is curious about what the 'eco-emotions' are
- Examines the role of emotions environmental work
- Experiment with processing emotions through sound/spoken word, (creative) writing and journaling, and creating a personal eulogy or lamentation
- Current status: needs 6 more students to run

Environmental Justice: Theory and Practice (EJTP)

- EJ theories and case studies
- Power dynamics and processes (e.g., coloniality, stigmatization)
- Sites of resistance, struggles for selfdetermination, recognition and affirmation, and emancipation
- Storytelling as a method for effectively conveying the struggles and successes in promoting environmental justice (contemporary as well as its historical role in indigenous cosmologies and knowledge systems)
- Current status: will run (10 students)

Transformative Agriculture and Development (TAD)

- Relationships between food and agriculture;
 historical memories; political regimes; cultures of taste; and processes of globalization
- Interactions between ecological and socio-cultural aspects of farming systems, agricultural politics, and food cultures throughout history in various regions of the world
- Four parts: histories of agriculture and development; alternatives and their discontents, current debates, food futures
- Correlates well with Environmental Ethnography course
- Current status: needs 4 more students to run
